2.6 Innovative processes adopted by the institution in Teaching and Learning:

MOOC (Massive Open Online Course)

As per the UGC & University of Madras guidelines, the institution motivated the students to register in SWAYAM portal, NPTEL, STM etc. for online learning.

To develop positive academic environment, the institution provided programmes like AIMS, DRE, FQC, ROP and SQC.

Implementation of these programmes augmented the overall performance of students as well as staff members.

SQC: Students Quality Circle programme was implemented to identify the slow learners and active learners. Based on their performance, the students are grouped into satisfactory and risk level categories. The satisfactory level students assist the slow learners to attain academic progress and pass the subjects with 100 % results.

Remedial Coaching and Counselling: According to the need of the students special coaching and counselling were provided to slow learners and students who failed in University examinations. Remedial coaching was provided to the students in English subject, as most of the students come from Tamil medium schools.


